Executive Summary

The BEYOU project, “Boosting Sustainability and Social Change through Youth-Led Community Development,” is a European Union-funded initiative designed to empower young people in marginalized communities across Italy, Spain, Greece, Cyprus, and Romania. These regions face significant challenges, including high levels of social exclusion and educational poverty among youth. The project’s primary aim is to foster youth-led community development, enhancing mechanisms of active participation and social responsibility.

Deliverable 4.3, “Educational Toolkit on Social Generativity and Youth-Led Community Development”, is a comprehensive digital handbook created to share the experiences and lessons learned during the training course with a broader audience of stakeholders and target groups from other local communities in Europe. 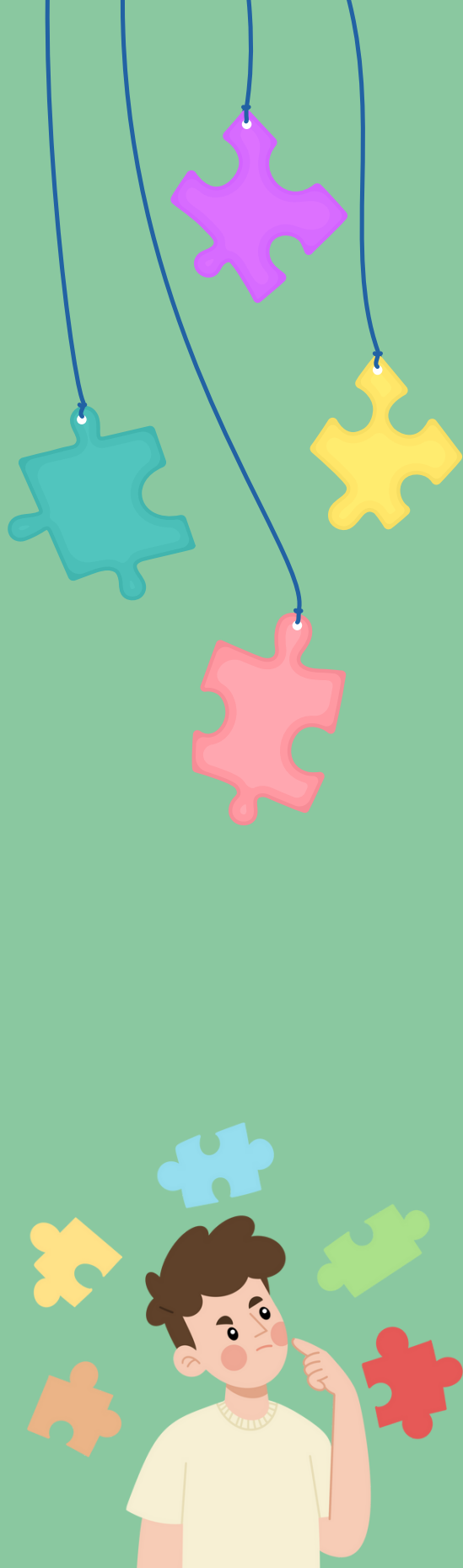

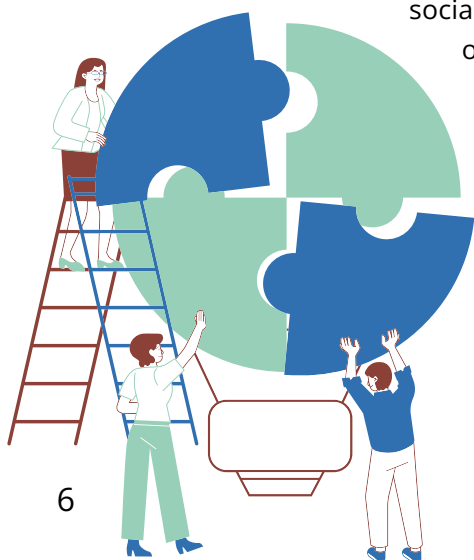

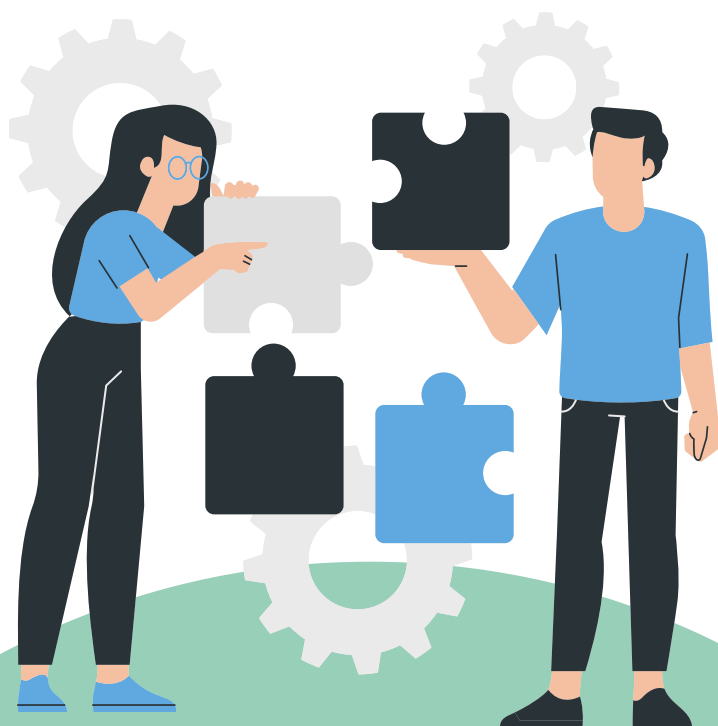

1. The BeYou project

● Project aims and objectives

BeYou is a project selected and co-funded by the Erasmus+ program under Key Action 3 “European Youth Together.” It is coordinated by Fondazione Comunitaria di Agrigento e Trapani, in partnership with Organization Earth (Greece), ANDCTR (Romania), Hub Nicosia (Cyprus), and Universidad de Alcalá de Henares (Spain).

Launched in December 2022, the BeYou project is designed to empower young individuals and strengthen their role as key agents of social change and sustainable development within their communities. The project aims to foster youth-led community development processes, enhancing mechanisms of active participation and social responsibility in marginalized community contexts. Its primary objectives include promoting youth empowerment and engagement, both locally and at the European level, and generating community-driven initiatives that empower youth to address issues directly impacting them.

● The Youth Community Incubator Programme within the BeYou Project

The Youth Community Incubator programme has been a cornerstone of the BeYou project enabling it to achieve the project’s objectives. Targeting 40 young participants from Italy, Greece, Spain, Romania, and Cyprus, the programme has significantly contributed to harnessing the transformative potential of younger generations.

Between April and June 2023, 20 youth workers from Italy, Greece, Spain, Romania, and Cyprus aged 25 to 35 were selected through a call for interest. These youth workers underwent a five-day transnational peer-learning training held in Agrigento from July 3 to 7, 2023. The training equipped them with essential tools and skills, including social generativity, youth-led practices promoting sustainability and social innovation, theory of change, project management, implementation and evaluation. This preparation enabled them to effectively coordinate “Youth Community Incubators” in their respective countries.

Following the training of youth workers, 20 young individuals aged 16 to 25, facing social disadvantages, were selected through a call for proposals between August and December 2023 to assume leadership roles in developing their own initiatives. The young leaders selected participated in local training programs, which equipped them with foundational knowledge and skills necessary for the implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of their projects.

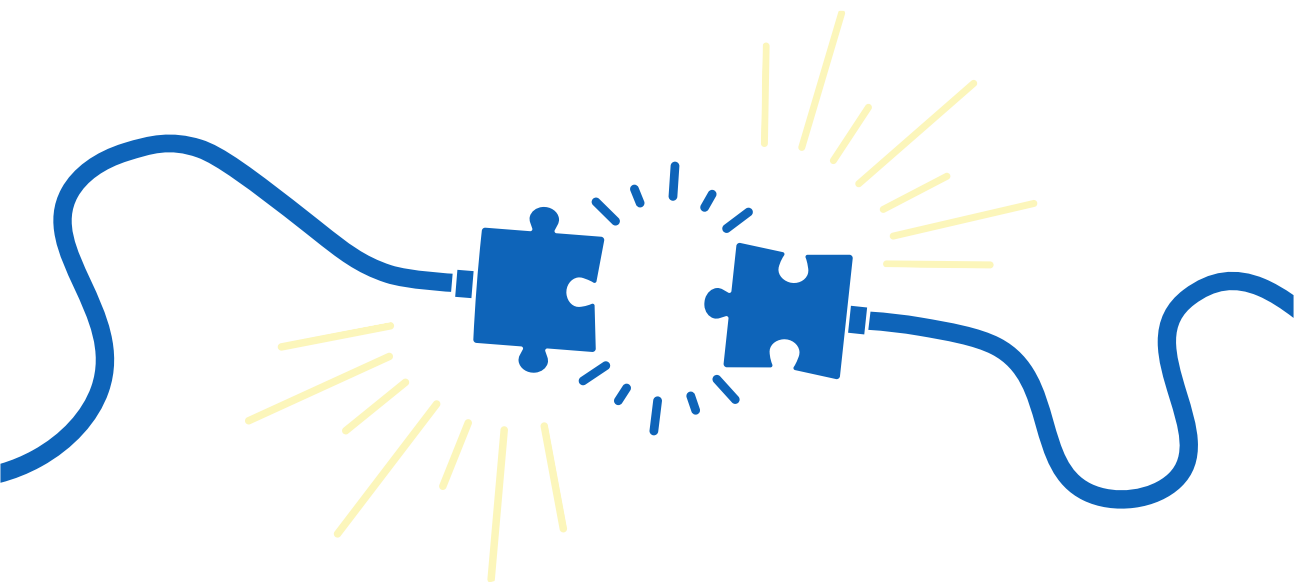
From February to April 2024, the young leaders, supported by the youth workers, implemented 20 different initiatives aimed at sustainable and inclusive community development. The young leaders selected were granted a maximum of 1000,00 euros for the purchase of goods and services necessary for the implementation of the project activities. Thereby, they applied the skills they had acquired in their training to mobilize resources and initiate social innovation processes. The initiatives developed, each lasting two to three months, were designed to address specific needs within their local areas spanning Italy, Greece, Spain, Cyprus, and Romania.

From May 30 to June 3, 2024, a transnational workshop was held in Greece, where the young leaders shared their experiences and outcomes. This workshop provided a platform for peer discussions on amplifying the impact of their projects at a European level, fostering a collaborative environment for further innovation and development.

2. How to set up a Youth Community Incubator



Setting up a Youth Community Incubator is a transformative process designed to empower young individuals to lead impactful community initiatives. This toolkit draws from the successful experiences of the BeYou Project, proposing the Youth Community Incubator as a model to foster youth engagement and leadership in community development.



2.1 Methodology and key roles

The program aims to significantly contribute to inclusive and sustainable development within local communities, recognizing the transformative potential of younger generations. Inspired by the Youth Bank model originated in Ireland, the Youth Community Incubator engages and mobilizes n. youth workers to support n. young leaders at risk of social exclusion in planning and developing initiatives.

Youngsters guided by other youngsters acquire leadership skills in resource mobilization facilitating the initiation of social innovation and sustainable development processes. Their roles extended beyond mere project implementation, actively engaging local stakeholders, including public administrations, schools, third-sector organizations, and the broader community. In this way, the Youth Community Incubator model not only shapes the personal growth of youngsters but also significantly contributes to the inclusive and sustainable development of their communities.

The Youth Community Incubator model, as applied within the BeYou project, follows a structured and comprehensive approach to empower young individuals. This methodology involves several key components and stages:

- 1. Selection and Training of Youth Workers**
- 2. Identification and Empowerment of Young Leaders**
- 3. Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation of Youth-led Initiatives**
- 4. Transnational Peer Learning and Knowledge Sharing**

The youth workers



This toolkit provides detailed guidelines on who youth workers are and how to train them to be effective in their roles. Young leaders within the Youth Community Incubator Programme are catalysts for innovation and positive change within their communities. They are passionate individuals who possess

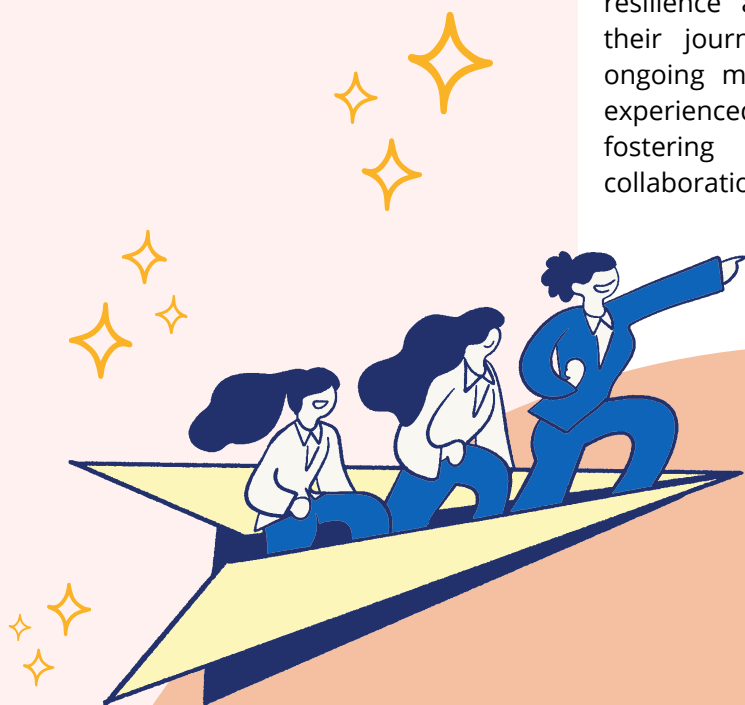

These individuals undergo training that enhances their leadership skills, equipping them with the tools and knowledge necessary to effectively plan, execute, and evaluate community initiatives.

Implementation of initiatives by young leaders is guided by principles of social generativity and sustainable development, ensuring that projects not only address immediate community needs but also contribute to long-term resilience and well-being. Throughout their journey, young leaders receive ongoing mentoring and support from experienced youth workers and peers, fostering an environment of collaboration and shared learning.



2.2 The training

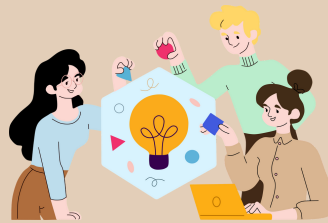

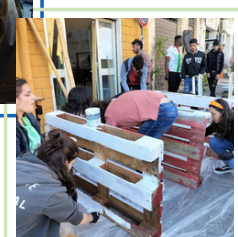
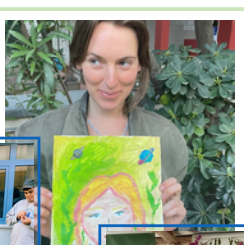
2.3 Implementation, monitoring and evaluation of youth-led community initiatives

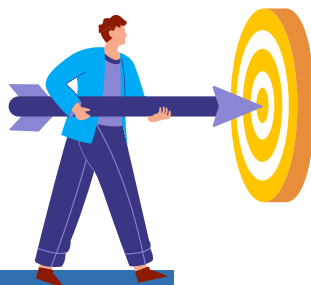

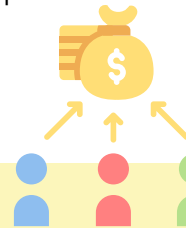
- Capacity Building and Knowledge Transfer

Fundraising Strategies
